

School Attire


- Typical School Days: Day-to-day wear at school is casual. Feel free to wear whatever you feel comfortable in including jeans, shorts, leggings, sweat pants, t-shirts, etc.
- Lab Days: Wear something you are okay getting messy. Long pants are recommended for grinding plastic and many people choose to wear scrubs on all lab days.
- Patient Model Days: Baylor blue scrubs (which you will be given early in the year) or business causal is required
- Guest Lecture Days: Business casual!

Other Tips

- Summer is hurricane season be prepared for lots of rain, very humid days, and the potential for power outages in the event of a hurricane
- The classroom is COLD bring layers even when it's hot outside
- It may be helpful to keep an extra set of clothes/shoes at school for casting/fitting days

STUDY TIPS

- Finding someone from class who you can talk through difficult concepts with can help substantially when trying to understand new material.
- Take advantage of the Academic Success Center. They are there to help you!
- Rewriting notes and lecture material shortly after lectures.
- Think out loud, even if you are just talking to yourself.
- Answer and understand the learning objectives from lecture slides.
- Make flashcards and utilize Quizlet.
- Preparing a night in advance for any lab or patient model days will make them significantly less stressful.
- Break up the material, while most things we learn connect eventually it helps to break it down into bite sized pieces.
- Study multiple days before exams, do not attempt to cram.
- Take time for yourself, things are fast, but you need to have a social life too.
- The textbooks that are recommended can be great resources during and after didactic, some books are provided!



TRANSPORTATION



Getting to BCM or getting around Houston can feel a bit overwhelming at first, but don't worry-we've got you covered!

Students have several transportation options, including public transit, apartment shuttles, and other personal methods.

APARTMENT SHUTTLE SERVICES

We as a class strongly recommend shuttle services through the local apartment complexes. Several complexes provide a direct route to the medical center. Properties like Villas at Hermann Park (included), Hermann Park Lofts (included), Stella at the Medical Center, and The Circle at Hermann Park (fee to ride) offer this convenient perk.

METROBUS

The Metrobus is a reliable choice, with stops scattered throughout the city, including one right outside the Cullen building, making it a convenient way to reach campus. The Metro Trip app provides real-time bus schedules and arrival updates to make commuting easier.

METRORAIL

Another popular option is the Metrorail, which runs along Fannin Street in both directions. Many students use it to travel between campus, downtown, and their apartments. A reloadable metro card, available at Metro offices, offers discounted rates for students and can be used on both the Metrobus and Metrorail.
