getting to know each other

Celebrating Motherhood through Adoption

Since 2019, I have served as a board member for the Gladney Center for Adoption in Fort Worth, TX. Growing up in Fort Worth, I had always heard about Gladney; in fact, I used to

babysit for the attorney who is now General Counsel for the Center. It was she who I called when my husband, Ryan, and I were considering adoption as the way to grow our family.

In 2012, we brought home our baby girl, Charlie, and since then, we've continually looked for ways to give back to Gladney for bringing her into our lives. So when the Gladney board chair asked if I would consider joining their board, I immediately agreed. I quickly learned, though, that they weren't just interested in me because of all my volunteer service to Gladney – they were also interested in me because of my experience in research.

Recently, Gladney shifted more of their focus to adoptions out of foster care, which included transforming their dormitory that once housed birth mothers into a home for teen girls in foster care. I was part of a task force that aimed to define and measure outcomes for the girls, both during and after their time in the Gladney home. An important goal was to ensure that the girls left the home better than when they arrived. We proposed a range of outcomes that included standardized behavioral assessments, permanent product measures, academic performance, and girls' self reports.

More recently, I was asked to advise on a quality improvement project to decrease the number of disruptions (adoptions ending before they have been

> finalized) and dissolutions (adoptions ending after they have been finalized) for adoptions out of foster care. These adoptions can be testing because the traumas children in foster care have experienced often manifest through challenging behaviors, and adoptive parents may not have support and training in how to manage these situations. Gladney hopes to identify factors that facilitate successful foster-care adoptions, as well as those that signify a need for more parent training/supports to decrease the likelihood of disruption or dissolution.

As much as I've contributed to Gladney through board service, I feel that I've received so much more in return. The other board members come from a wide

variety of backgrounds and from all over the country, and each was selected to contribute their respective areas of expertise. I learn something new at each meeting that I can apply in my professional life. Gladney has operated for more than 135 years, and the entire board is vested in the legacy of Edna Gladney and the belief that every child deserves a loving family. It is incredibly rewarding to know that I am part of a community that is influencing the field of adoption in ways that will broadly impact adoption processes to make the experience better for all adoptive children and families.



FOCUS on Center for Children and Women, Greenspoint

On December 1, 2023, **The Center for Children and Women at Greenspoint** closed its doors after 10 years of service and more than 550,000 pediatric visits. The Center Greenspoint opened in August 2013 and served exclusively Medicaid and CHIP patients with the Texas screenings. A grant program with the Houston Food Bank (HFB) allowed a HFB Market Trailer to come to the clinic twice a month to offer healthy foods and produce. Since 2020, there were more than 1,000 patient visits to the Market Trailer and more than 2,000 visits from the community, providing a much-

Children's Health Plan. Along with its sister clinic in Southwest Houston, The Center Greenspoint was part of an innovative value-based healthcare model that offered services to areas in Houston with vulnerable populations. This model incentivized quality, preventive care, cost reduction, and equitable access. Several unique practices adopted at the Centers included providing services in the evenings and on weekends to reduce EC/UC utilization, having an in-house pharmacy which

suggests medications with cheaper alternatives, and having multidisciplinary service lines including behavioral health, dental, nutrition, speech, optometry, and OB/Gyn in one location to improve healthcare access. Emphasis on preventive care allowed the clinic to be one of the top providers of immunizations in the entire TCH system. Texas DSHS data have shown that the clinic's HPV vaccination rate was in the top 5% of state VFC providers. During the height of the pandemic, it was also a Covid vaccination hub and provided more than 12,000 Covid vaccinations to the community and patients.

The clinic had an integrated Behavioral Health department, which allowed for just-in-time consultation for mental health concerns, which was critical to the Center Greenspoint patient population. The integration with Behavioral Health also allowed the clinic to be early adopters of Social Determinants of Health screenings. Since 2017, the clinic screened for food insecurity, postpartum depression, and intimate partner violence and offered resources for positive



needed resource in the Greenspoint area, which is considered a food desert.

Notably, the clinic played a major role in the teaching of outpatient general pediatrics to BCM learners. Through the years, it was the continuity clinic for 60 pediatric residents and served as an outpatient rotation for more than 250 BCM medical and physician assistant students. Learners also had the experience of visiting and collaborating with the many different service lines. This offered


the opportunity for learners to experience how a multidisciplinary team provides care to a vulnerable population and expanded learners' awareness of equitable healthcare.

Prior to closure, patients seen at the Greenspoint location were given a new provider in their community. Care coordinators at both the health plan and the Center assisted with patients with complex medical needs. Patients were also able to continue care at the Center Southwest location, if they desired. TCH/BCM is actively working on a new care model that will provide continued care for underserved communities while also training learners.
