

Tell us briefly about your professional background? How did you get to where you are? What is your current role in DOP?




How do you practice self-care?

Tell us briefly about your professional background. How did you get to where you are? What is your current role in DOP?

My first role after my undergraduate education was as a pediatrics and women's services registered nurse. I then decided to go back to graduate school to become a pediatric nurse practitioner. I received an excellent educational foundation as both a nurse and nurse practitioner from my alma mater, The University of Texas at Austin. I always had a goal to work in pediatric endocrinology, as I myself was diagnosed with type 1 diabetes at 3 years old and was very positively impacted by my care providers at TCH growing up. When I received the opportunity to work in endocrinology with diabetes

patients at BCM/TCH in 2021 after becoming a nurse practitioner, it felt like a full circle moment.

I have spent the last few years working both on the inpatient side and in ambulatory care with our diabetes patients. The acute care management of our patients in the hospital and as the chronic management in clinic have given me a wellrounded training and perspective that I am thankful for today. Over time, I became passionate about ensuring adequate training and education was offered for our new advanced practice providers in our department. I was promoted last year to the Advanced Practice Provider Director in our division, which has allowed me to help plan the onboarding and training of new APPs and create educational opportunities for the group as a whole, regardless of experience level. I also feel I have the ability in this role to help foster positive relationships between our APP group and the rest of the team as well as advocate for what APPs can bring to the table.

I wish I was a morning person, but I have not gotten there yet, so I always start my day with a cup of coffee no matter what. I end my day at home by watching a show or movie with my husband and pets (pictured center). I also enjoy an evening walk with my dogs as often as possible.

Highlights from Public Health Pediatrics

Injury Control Research Center to be Established

Injury Control Research Centers (ICRCs) play a critical role in advancing the understanding of violence and injuries and develop effective prevention strategies to ultimately reduce the burden of injuries and violence on individuals and communities.



BCM and UTHealth Houston were recently awarded \$4.25 million over five years from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to collaboratively establish the first Injury Control Research Center in the state of Texas. Named the **Violence and Injury Prevention Research (VIPR) Center**, it will focus on preventing adverse childhood and community experiences, violence across the lifespan, suicide, and firearm violence. The core components of the Center are research, training and education, and outreach. VIPR is led by Director Dr. Jeff Temple, Associate Dean for Clinical Research at UT Health School of Behavioral Health Sciences. The BCM site is co-lead by **Dr. Christopher Greeley**, Chief of Public Health Pediatrics and Vicechair of Community Health (co-director), and **Dr. Cary Cain**. There are (now) 11 ICRCs around the country,

Suicide Response & Prevention

The Division has been actively involved in suicide prevention for the last few years. Beginning in the fall of 2021, **Ms. Diane Kaulen** (below, left), Senior Community Initiatives Coordinator, led the implementation of the **Zero Suicide Framework** for TCH. The overall strategy, workgroups formed, implementation process, and tangible results of this 1.5 year initiative have been presented at the local, state, and national levels. These efforts have resulted in virtual suicide prevention training that was taken by over 65% of the organization, the development of a SharePoint site with resources and trainings for providers and staff, a system-level dashboard that monitored suicide screening, assessment and care metrics and the development of the TCH Behavioral Health System of Care Team.



The Division has expanded its efforts to community-based initiatives and research to further expand our work in the realm of suicide prevention. Ms. Kaulen is the co-chair of the recently launched Houston Area Suicide Prevention Coalition (HASPC), which includes founding members from BCM, the Council on Recovery, the Harris Center, Mental Health America of Greater Houston, TCH, the Veteran's Administration, Resources for Children and Adults and Zero Suicide. HASPC was awarded the Outstanding Local Coalition Award through the Texas Suicide Prevention Council in September 2024. **Dr. Angela Cummings** (above, left) chairs the HASPC Strategic Planning Action Team and leads the community needs assessment to inform and guide future HASPC efforts. The needs assessment is funded through the Next Day Project, a grant awarded to fund a partnership between the City of Houston Mayor's Office of Education and BCM Psychiatry.




Texas Children's Ranks as Number 1 in Texas


